We were all in boot camp in San Diego together, then Mike and I went through training to become medics. In 67-68 we both did a tour in Vietnam. After the service, I went to school at Brigham Young Univ. in Utah and got a degree in Zoology in ' 72. I met my bride to be at BYU and we were married in ' 73 (and still are). We moved to the San Jose area and I had more careers than Carter had pills: Surgical Technician, Machinist, Real Estate Broker, Sales Manager, Estimator, Manufacturer's Rep., Investment counselor, & started or bought three different businesses, all the while, my wife Janet worked
